2019 FALL SKIPPERS' PARTY

The Fall Skippers' Party is scheduled for 2 November 2019 at the Newport Yacht Club, 110 Long Wharf Newport, RI 02840. Heavy Hors d'oeurvs will be provided so please let me know if you plan on attending (I need an estimate). The next Forum/Shore Party will be March 2020.

We actually have an agenda for this Party. One of our own skippers, Phil Haydon, will do the following half hour presentation:

Sleep while sailing solo offshore - tips and considerations

Phil Haydon, Ph.D. is both a neuroscientist who studies the regulation of sleep and a solo offshore sailor. He has integrated his scientific knowledge with sources of information provided by others to develop his own "checklist" to follow when racing offshore. He will share this information in the hope that it will be helpful to other sailors and prevent them making errors, that can be serious, after prolonged periods of sleep deprivation.

2021 BERMUDA ONE-TWO DATES

We have scheduled the next Bermuda One-Two in 2021. The start to Bermuda is on Friday (back to a Friday) 4 June and the return to Newport is on Thursday 17 June. Make your plans!

SKIPPERS' REPRESENTATIVE

For those that may not know, Tristan Mouligne continues his reign as the Skippers' Representative. Tristan was reelected at the last Awards. Tristan has been participating in our Race Committee meetings in the preparations leading up to the past two Bermuda One-Two races as well as racing in the New England Solo/Twin races as well as five Bermuda One - Two races. Tristan has also been involved with communicating with many new and potential skippers.

2019 BERMUDA ONE-TWO RECAP

Our numbers were a little down this year with three minis and five Class 40s (both in their own classes). 36 skippers registered (14, again, were first timers which is nice to see), 28 boats actually started the singlehanded leg to Bermuda and only 20 boats finished (8 turned back, not the smallest fleet but the biggest attrition since 1979). Returning after a hiatus since 2005 Juan Perez at 85 did the singlehanded leg this time on a 28' Tartan. We missed a bunch of the regulars that didn't make it this year and hope to see them in 2021. Robert Kelly met up with us in Bermuda for the return leg having made a delivery to Bermuda from the Islands. 19 boats started the doublehanded leg to Newport (Velocity Girl, Richard Lett, headed for the Azores planning on doing some racing in Europe and the OneStar next year, Bolero, Juan Perez, did his usual and headed home just after the start for Newport) and 15 finished (however all these boats made it back home, two people broke ribs while below decks).

- Before we even left for starting on start day to Bermuda, Mary McCarthy-Mann was taken to the hospital with what turned out to be a kidney stone attack. Doug had accompanied Mary to the hospital so I did not expect Doug to race the singlehanded leg. However, during the start sequence I heard Zipporah check in and start just in time for his class! Mary was doing fine.

- I seem to remember the wind predictions were just 10-15 kts for the race however many said winds over 30 kts occurred. They ran into square waves and a lot of crashing off the waves; very uncomfortable. Mostly close hauled down to near Bermuda with the wind out of the SE causing them to tack to make the finish line. Juan Perez complained that the whole race was close hauled.

- **Velocity Girl** made for an interesting start going over the start line about 1 minute before it's start with the spinnaker up! He was seen heading back to the line with the spinnaker draped over the headstay.

- The attrition rate was amazing with 8 boats returning home for various reasons. David Southwell on **Alchemy**, a new J/121, developed a bent rudder post after catching one of the buoys at the continental shelf and returned on his emergency rudder. Highlander returned due to his motor no longer running and was unable to charge his batteries. Nimros and Flow turned back with more problems than they wanted to sail to Bermuda with.

- Flying Turtle developed a leak at the rudder post and initially thought he would return but after evaluating the leak and potential to fix it in Bermuda decided to continue. Murray was able to fix it in Bermuda with a new rubber boot.

- Abilyn had a total failure of his electronics, thus auto pilot, but later the same day discovered that his Garmin was causing the problem and was able to recover his electronics especially the auto pilot.

- **Privateer** was leading most of the way down to Bermuda after being the last Class 40 to start. However, Privateer was the East most boat heading into Bermuda and had to tack to make the finish line and finished last in his class. Dragon took advantage with a tack earlier on to the SW to allow him to finish first overall and in Class 5.

- Most of the race two minis, **806** and **Trouble No Trouble**, and **Bolero** were together at the back of the fleet. **Trouble No Trouble** took the Bermuda Onion Trophy by finishing last.

- Ted Singsen and I flew to Bermuda together. Ted did an amazing job of helping boats dock at Customs and help them dock at the St. George's Dinghy & Sports Club. Also helping with the boats was Rick Rorhoer; a potential B12 in 2021. Rick was there because he had singlehanded down there the week before and singlehanded back the Friday after the boats arrived. Sounds like a definite B12 skipper.

- Three skippers that had to turn back home actually flew to Bermuda since they had relatives flying down anyways and joined us in our activities and the Awards; David Southwell, Phil Haydon and Jonathan Bixby.

- Aggressive, who carried the trophies to be given in Bermuda, was the last of the 8 boats to return home. Aggressive returned home in time for Kristen Wenzel to pick up the trophies and deliver them to Amy & Gerry Leger in time for their flight to Bermuda (Gerry was return crew for Gryphon).

- Brenda Tweed (bartender/cook) does an amazing job of taking care of us while there but kept complaining about the small group that was there. "Where are all the regulars?"

- Thanks to Jan Stringos we had pictures at the Awards in Bermuda.

- The return leg was similar in difficulty to the first leg. Two people returned with broken ribs from being thrown around below decks.

- **Privateer** left Bermuda leading the Class 40s and steadily increasing their lead finishing about 53nm ahead of 2nd boat **Dragon** (with leads bigger than that at times).

2019 NEW ENGLAND SOLO/TWIN

This year's Solo/Twin race was held 26/27 July. 28 boats entered this year (down from 33 last year). We had one solo monohull spinnaker class with 3 participants, one multihull class with 6 participants and the rest were doublehanded monohulls. The predictions for the weather were very, very light winds, again, for Friday and Saturday. The slowest spinnaker class and cruising canvas classes were given the 65 nm course and the rest did the 77 nm course. Since the first boats to finish were around midnight Saturday morning and the last one was around 10am, the courses were a little short. The boats started in a nice light wind out of the SE; Oohla didn't know where the start line was and started 21 minutes late. The first boat to finish was Artemis by Trevor Nelson and David Mateme at 2332 Friday night sailing in Class 4 Cruising Canvas on the 65 nm course. The first boat to finish sailing the 77 nm course was Swamp Fox sailed by the family team of Don and son Nat Watson at 2353 Friday night. In Class 1 Alchemy sailed by David Southwell and Scott Meier finished 1st elapsed and Next Wave sailed by Stephen Clarke and Brian Leach finished first in corrected time. In Class 2 the first boat to finish in both elapsed and corrected times was Samba sailed by Tristan Mouligne and Ted Winston. Class 3 elapsed time winner was Dauntless sailed by Matthew Breuer and Felicia Lombard but corrected time winner was Yankee Girl sailed by Thomas Vander Salm and Thomas Clemow. The first boat to finish in Class 4 both on elapsed and corrected times was Artemis sailed by Trevor Nelson and David Mateme. James Hennigan Jr. on SeaJai finished first in Class 5, the Solo monohull spinnaker class, both on elapsed and corrected times. In Class 6 Swamp Fox sailed by Don and Nat Watson finished first in elapsed time and corrected time winner was Flying Fish sailed by the family team of Steve and son Josh Parks.

Four boats withdrew this year.

Five boats had family crew.
